
## BP CREATES UT SCHOLARSHIPS IN BUSINESS AND ENGINEERING

**M**ore than 100 people gathered in UT's Driscoll Alumni Center on Feb. 24 to celebrate the \$225,000 gift which will establish the BP Scholars Program at The University of Toledo.

Devoted to increasing the number of women and minority professionals in business and engineering disciplines, the leadership gift will provide scholarships for both first-year and continuing students.

"Beyond our core business, BP invests in communities across more than 80 countries worldwide. One of our major priorities is supporting education, and we are pleased to be partnering with The University of Toledo," said Mark Dangler, president of the BP-Husky Refinery LLC in Oregon, Ohio.

Paid out over three years, annual scholarships of \$2,500 will be awarded to more than two dozen students in the colleges of Engineering and Business and Innovation. BP also will mix the scholarships between high-achieving current and incoming students and target residents of northwest Ohio and southeast Michigan.

Dr. Thomas Gutteridge, dean of the College of Business and Innovation, and Dr. Nagi Naganathan, dean of the College of Engineering, praised the longtime partnerships BP has had with both colleges.

"BP has demonstrated repeatedly its commitment to the next generation of business leaders, and this scholarship is just the latest example," said Dr. Gutteridge, who pointed out that the scholarship fund is for students majoring in finance or entrepreneurship. He added the college will utilize \$25,000 of its BP funding to establish a Minority Business Development Program.

Dr. Naganathan said, “A longtime partner in our co-op program, BP has repeatedly supported the research and academic activities of this college and our students. I can think of no more fitting occasion for BP to demonstrate its continuing generosity than during this week set aside nationally to honor engineers.”

Vern Snyder, vice president for institutional advancement, said that \$25,000 of the donation would go to support women and minority initiatives in the College of Engineering. “BP is an organization that gives strategically, with purpose, and as a result sees a tremendous return on its investments in the community. I have no doubt that trend will continue with this gift,” he said.

Scholarship winners also will take part in a tour of the Oregon, Ohio, refinery and lunch with BP leadership.

“Northwest Ohio has so many talented men and women, and BP is proud to support students in their studies,” Mr. Dangler said. “Currently, our refinery in Oregon has over 50 University of Toledo graduates working at the site, by far the largest representation of any one university working at our refinery. This scholarship program with UT is an excellent opportunity to support education in the communities in which we work, live and raise our families.”

UT President Lloyd Jacobs said BP is a great community partner.

“We strive every day to make sure the education UT provides is relevant to a student’s growth, professionally, personally and culturally,” said Dr. Jacobs. “Partners like BP help students along that path, and the result is an increase in college graduates prepared to thrive in the professional world.”

## GROUND BROKEN ON HSC CAMPUS FOR NEW VETERANS CLINIC

The U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs has broken ground on a new outpatient clinic for veterans, located on The University of Toledo’s Health Science Campus.

The 99,850-square-foot facility will be built on land purchased from the UT Foundation and will replace the existing Glendale Avenue facility that the Ann Arbor Veterans Integrated Service Network leases from the University.

At a March 28 ceremony, UT officials said the new clinic will provide opportunities for a closer relationship with the VA and new clinical training experiences for medical student rotations and resident education.

“Care for this nation’s veterans is a unique privilege and represents an outstanding educational opportunity for undergraduate and graduate medical education and education across the range of health professions,” said Dr. Jeffrey Gold, chancellor and executive vice

president for biosciences and health affairs. “UT and UTMC are proud to participate in the delivery of their care.

“The ability for our learners to work closely with Veterans Affairs physicians and clinicians only increases the value of a University of Toledo health professional education,” said Dr. Gold, who also serves as dean of the College of Medicine and Life Sciences.

UT President Lloyd Jacobs, himself a veteran, thanked Congresswoman Marcy Kaptur for her work in bringing the new facility to Toledo.

“The reason we will break ground Monday, and the reason we will do it on the UT Health Science Campus, is due to the tireless advocacy of Marcy Kaptur for the veterans in northwest Ohio,” Dr. Jacobs said.

“It has been an honor to partner with the Department of Veterans Affairs at the Glendale facility, and I know that partnership will only get stronger,” he said.

## UT WINS NATIONAL TOURNAMENT



The University of Toledo women's basketball team capped off a winning season by defeating the University of Southern California, 76-68, to win the 2011 Women's National Invitation Tournament Championship. The Lady Rockets became the first Mid-American Conference basketball program to capture a national postseason tournament. The WNIT Championship was played in front of a sold-out crowd of 7,301 fans in Savage Arena, breaking a school and MAC-wide women's basketball attendance record.

## UTF TO IMPROVE SERVICES THROUGH SYSTEM CONVERSION

The University of Toledo Foundation is planning a system conversion expected to streamline operations and make the organization's services more efficient.

The conversion includes a new donor/fund management program and a new accounting program with a broader range of capabilities.

Among the long-term benefits will be a greater capability for electronic communication and reporting, which will save costs and aid the organization's "green" efforts.

The Foundation's new accounting program will also offer a self-service menu of on-demand financial and fund activity reports.

As data is converted, some errors and inaccuracies are likely to occur. Donors may notice problems such as incorrect name assemblies or salutations, as well as potential issues with receipt and pledge information. Some delays with gift or

pledge acknowledgements may also occur.
