






## POINTS **OF PRIDE**



The University of Toledo has been recognized for the first time among the top universities in the country in the 2022-2023 U.S. News and World Report Best Colleges rankings. UToledo climbed in the rankings for improvements in a number of metrics in the report's methodology, but most importantly on student success measures including retention and graduation rates, class sizes and faculty-to-student ratios. The University improved in the rankings on several metrics related to resources for faculty and the value of a UToledo education, including financial resources per student and average indebtedness of graduates.

We honored our storied history and bright future during our 150th Founder's Day celebration on Oct. 12, 2022. Our students, pursuing their dreams and excelling in their classes right now, are that bright future.

For the academic year 2021-22, **77% of enrolled students needed financial assistance**. An important part of recognizing this historic milestone is our \$5 million sesquicentennial campaign that will directly support need-based scholarships for deserving students.

Our commitment to student success also was reflected in the 2022-2023 U.S. News and World Report Best Colleges rankings, where for the first time UToledo was recognized among the top universities in the country. UToledo also is ranked among the top universities in the world by U.S. News & World Report in its Best Global Universities rankings. It's fitting that these recognitions arrived as we celebrate our 150-year legacy.

In August, our strong reputation for groundbreaking research grew even further, as the University was tabbed to lead a multimillion-dollar solar energy consortium administered by the U.S. Department of Energy. We're proud to help power the future through our decades of expertise in solar energy research and commercialization.

UToledo also received the 2022 Public Impact Award from the Association of Public and Land-grant Universities (APLU) recognizing the Water Task Force's efforts to protect water quality and the health of Lake Erie. UToledo's scientists, engineers, medical researchers and public health and legal experts are doing important work to restore our greatest natural resource for future generations.

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## \$5 Million Sesquicentennial Campaign Lends a Hand to Deserving Students

Nivene Elmays has wanted to be in the medical field since she was a child.

Growing up, she saw her father and other close family members affected by serious illnesses, ultimately inspiring her to choose exercise science as a major. She's now a junior at The University of Toledo.

"When my baby cousin was diagnosed with cancer, I realized I wanted to work in pediatrics," says Elmays.

"I love children and there's nothing more rewarding than improving a child's life and allowing them to live to their full potential."

Helping people realize their potential is also the goal of the fundraising campaign launched for UToledo's sesquicentennial.

As part of the historic milestone, all contributions to the \$5 million effort will directly support need-based scholarships – either at the campaign level or within a college of choice.

"This is a special moment and we've found a special way to celebrate," according to Floyd Akins, vice president for university advancement.

"Our vision is that financial strain is never a barrier for motivated students with a passion to learn, and we can only realize that dream with the support of the Rocket community."

Thousands of UToledo students are navigating an uncertain economy to earn their diplomas.

For the academic year 2021-22, 77% of enrolled students had costs of attendance higher than their families had the ability to cover. Among undergraduates, 56% received some type of need-based aid.

Matches are in place to help achieve the campaign's ambitious fundraising target. Gifts in any amount help unlock a \$1.5 million match, and donations of \$150 and above will be matched dollar for dollar up to \$1 million. At the heart of it all are students like Elmays, who received the Huntington Bank Opportunity Scholarship to not only help earn her degree, but also to honor her father for everything he has done for her family.

"Your generosity is appreciated far more than you know," says Elmays.

## \$1 Million Gift Seeks to Further Diversify Legal Ranks

The message that inspired a \$1 million gift benefiting students in The University of Toledo's College of Law is simple — we can all do more.

As Ottawa Hills natives **Pete and Amy Kadens** considered ways to honor Pete's parents, **Michael and Judith Kadens**, that idea kept returning to them. Michael Kadens is professor emeritus at Toledo Law, and the college played a key role in Pete Kadens' upbringing — highlighted by an experience at the age of eight.

"In 1985, my father was granted a six-month academic sabbatical that changed me forever," said Kadens. "While my father did his research, our family traveled to several countries and I went to school abroad as well. I saw the world through such a unique lens after that journey."

The trip provided Kadens with a firsthand education in poverty, varying political systems and other aspects of the world outside Ohio. This experience complemented his life on

campus, where his family had season tickets to men's basketball games and Kadens could be found playing in College of Law softball games or attending moot court competitions.

His father's perspective was likewise shaped by his career as an educator.

"I've always been aware of the contrast between my good fortune and the gross inequities endured by so many people," said Michael Kadens. "The study of law is a fascinating and diverse matter, affording opportunities to develop the mind and nourish even the most insatiable curiosity. This gift is explicitly intended to level the playing field, enhancing students' opportunities to flourish, achieve their dreams and realize their true potential."

Kadens' pledge of \$1 million establishes the Michael and Judith Kadens Scholarship for Diversity in Legal Practice Fund, which will advance social, economic and cultural diversity at UToledo. The fund will focus on

first-generation students in financial need with preference for graduates of Toledo-area high schools.

"On behalf of everyone at the University, we're deeply grateful to the Kadens family for their generosity and service," UToledo President Gregory Postel said. "While deserving students will receive immediate aid thanks to this gift, it reflects a clear investment in the spirit and vitality of our region."

The first recipients of scholarships awarded are VyJet' Derden, Clif Porter and Maha Zeidan. All began their first semester of law school in fall 2021.



## Rockets Fuel Record \$1,977,589 in Day of Giving Fundraising

Records are made to be broken – and University of Toledo supporters established a new one in 2022, with \$1,977,589 in contributions during the fifth annual Day of Giving campaign.

The fundraising total reflects a 50% increase over 2021.

A total of 3,233 gifts were received as donors participated online and during live events in Toledo during the 36-hour fundraising campaign held April 6-7. The average gift of \$612 was 54% higher than the previous year.

Rocket alumni in particular continued to fuel the campaign's impact, making up more than half the overall donor count for the second straight year.

This participation is crucial, not only in terms of pure financial support for the University, but in reinforcing its reputation nationwide.

Alumni giving rates are factored into the collegiate rankings of several publications.

"For the fifth year running, the entire Rocket community is empowering our mission through this campaign," notes William Pierce '99, '09, associate vice president of alumni engagement and annual giving.

"We're grateful for the tremendous support from our alumni and donors because of what it means for the future of our students, colleges and programs. Every success enhances the value of a UToledo degree."

In deciding how their gifts would be designated, donors were able to choose from more than 2,000 funds available at The University of Toledo Foundation, supporting scholarships, athletic and educational programs, research, healthcare and community services, which make an impact throughout northwest Ohio, the Great Lakes region and elsewhere.

Area businesses lent their support to the campaign again in 2022. Attendees of the Toledo Mud Hens' second game of the season, as well as customers of The Blarney Irish Pub, Campus Pollyeyes, The Casual Pint, Home Slice Pizza, Jake's Saloon, Jed's Bancroft, Rick's City Diner and Table Forty 4 had opportunities to make campaign donations on April 6.

"We're thankful to Rockets around the world for helping Day of Giving reach record heights," said **Floyd Akins**, vice president for university advancement.

"Especially as we celebrate UToledo's sesquicentennial, this year's generosity takes on a whole new meaning. Each gift we received is a testament to how supported and well-positioned the entire University community is for its next 150 years."

## UToledo-led Solar Consortium Powered by Decades of Energy From Donors, Supporters

In August, the U.S. Department of Energy announced that The University of Toledo will lead a multimillion-dollar initiative to make cadmium telluride solar cells less expensive, more efficient and develop new markets for solar cell products.

The news came as the natural outcome of a commitment spanning more than 30 years at UToledo – where researchers, educators and students have been empowered to thrive thanks to a passionate base of donor support.

In 2008, the late Helen McMaster and her family, longtime contributors to the University, established the Harold and Helen McMaster Chair in Photovoltaics.

Harold McMaster was an inventor who made a name for himself in the glass industry and solar energy field, co-founding Glasstech Inc., Glasstech Solar Inc. and Solar Cells Inc.

**Michael Heben, Ph.D.,** was named the endowed chair in 2018 and is managing director of UToledo's Wright Center

for Photovoltaics Innovation and Commercialization.

"This donation from the McMaster family has helped Toledo solidify its position as the Solar City in addition to being the Glass City," says Heben.

"Endowed professorships are so incredibly important to the vitality of the University, particularly because we are a public institution."

U.S. Secretary of Energy Jennifer M. Granholm and U.S. Representative Marcy Kaptur made the consortium announcement from UToledo, where officials gathered near a 337-kilowatt solar array that sits on 2.3 acres of the Health Science Campus.

According to Heben, the Wright Center experiences unique, unplanned equipment needs and research opportunities. Access to additional funding affords flexibility that allows his team to be dynamic, responsive and supportive. They have been able to provide stipends for summer research interns coming from local Toledo high schools, as well as pay for travel that may not otherwise be possible.

"Donor support confirms and enhances UToledo's research reputation by allowing faculty to pursue cutting-edge research and for students to become involved early in their careers," he says.

"This fuels and gives positive feedback to a virtuous cycle that can take Rocket Nation to the next level."




## **STRENGTH IN NUMBERS**

Reflecting similar trends at other institutions — as well as inflation and wider economic factors — giving to UToledo decreased 14% compared to fiscal 2021.

However, our total number of donors rose to 9,717 and alumni participation in our Day of Giving campaign held strong, underscoring the continued spirit and generosity of the Rocket community.




## **LONG-TERM GROWTH**

While markets were down globally, the Foundation's portfolio held up well relative to our benchmark. A decline in assets is always disappointing, yet sometimes unavoidable.

Our portfolio has a perpetual time horizon. Accordingly, we are confident it will gradually increase in value — even with losses like those we experienced in fiscal 2022.

Assets are positioned for long-term growth thanks to Foundation strategies to diversify its portfolio and otherwise mitigate risk.

Investments are overseen by the Foundation Board of Trustees. Its investment committee works with a consulting firm to develop policies and goals, establish the appropriate asset allocation, select investment managers and monitor performance.

## **INVESTMENT PERFORMANCE**




## **IN PERPETUITY**

The Foundation was not immune to the continued slumps of the wider market. However, we model our asset allocation to provide downside protection and losses were not as pronounced compared to industry benchmarks.

## SUPPORT PROVIDED TO UTOLEDO




#### **BACK TO BUSINESS**

Annualized returns on the Foundation's investments saw continued growth, which in turn helped increase our five-year average in support to the University to \$23.3 million.

As athletic events and other campus activities resumed in the wake of COVID-19, the Foundation's support returned to pre-pandemic levels.

## PRIMED TO RELAUNCH

On average, 97% of the gifts received by the Foundation are restricted, meaning that our donors have designated their support to a certain college, program or fund.

Athletics activities resumed as the risk and spread of COVID-19 gradually lessened. This translated to larger, more traditional levels of support to Rocket Athletics from the Foundation, when in fiscal 2020 \$4.3 million was provided.
