

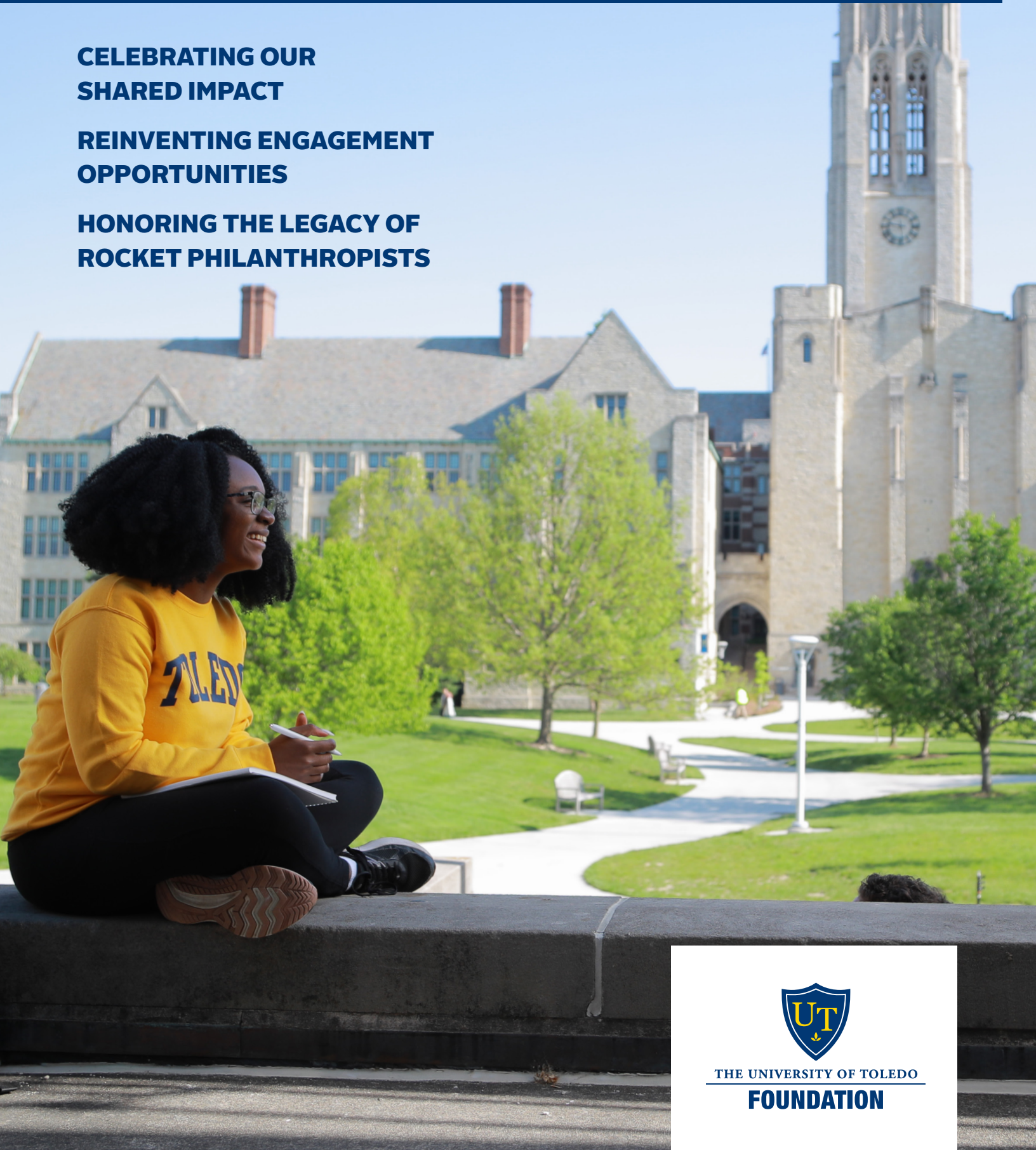

On April 8, members of the Rocket Community and visitors gathered on Main Campus to witness the total solar eclipse.

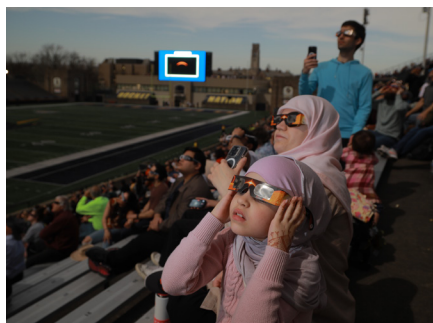
There were a variety of activities for all ages to enjoy before the main event, including inflatable games and food trucks.

## ROCKET FORWARD DAY OF GIVING

The University of Toledo Foundation thanks all our UToledo supporters who made the seventh-annual Rocket Forward Day of Giving campaign a success. The 36-hour crowdfunding effort generated \$1,713,122 in donations from 2,460 gifts through online donations and overall participation.

Day of Giving advocates were crucial to the overall success of the campaign, encouraging others to donate within their own networks and on their own individual social media channels.

This year, advocates generated more than 26% of all gifts, totaling more than \$530,000, using their unique donation links.





## UTOLEDO ATHLETICS INTRODUCES NEW VARSITY SPORT

The University of Toledo announced that it will add women's rowing as a varsity sport beginning in the 2025-26 school year.

Women's rowing, which will compete at the NCAA Division I level, will be the 17th varsity sport at Toledo and the first new addition to Rocket Athletics since women's soccer was added in 1995. A head coach is expected to be hired later this year, with a full year of acclimation leading into regular season competition in the fall of 2025. The full squad will feature approximately 50-60 student-athletes on its roster.

Vice President and Director of Athletics Bryan B. Blair shared that no resources would be reallocated from any of UToledo's current varsity sports, and infrastructure and other start-up costs will be relatively low. The team will practice and compete on the Maumee River and will utilize the Philip LeBoutillier, Jr. Memorial Boathouse in International Park in downtown Toledo. The boathouse is owned by Metroparks Toledo and is operated by the Toledo Rowing Foundation.

"I would like to thank Metroparks Toledo and the Toledo Rowing Foundation for their collaboration in bringing NCAA women's rowing to Toledo," Blair said. "This is a perfect example of what can happen when we work together with a #TeamToledo spirit to create an outcome that benefits our entire community."

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## ROCKET WOMEN'S BASKETBALL LEGACY CONTINUES

Ginny Boggess was officially introduced as the head women's basketball coach at The University of Toledo on April 16 in a press conference on Bob Nichols Court at Savage Arena.

Boggess, who has 21 years of coaching experience, comes to Toledo with an impressive resume that includes stops as an assistant coach at Marquette and Penn State, as well as a highly successful stint over the past three years as the head coach at Monmouth University.

"Every level, every move in my career was never to prepare a shiny resume or to get the next job," said Boggess, who led Monmouth to an NCAA Tournament appearance in just her second year at the helm. "It was always to prepare me for this moment. Every decision was not based on a salary or a title or a conference. For me it was where I could go to use my gift to empower young women to reach for greatness."

"I wanted to do more because I saw a need for African American therapists in our community," Green said. "I partnered with three other ladies who also shared the same passion. We wanted to build an agency that caters to not only minorities but all young adults suffering from mental and drug addiction."

With the help of UToledo, Green will be able to take her passion for helping

others further and continue to support her community through her business expertise.

## Graduating Biology Student Follows Sister's Footsteps in Dentistry

Peter Tsatalis and his sister, Dr. Andrea Tsatalis '17, '17 have a close bond; so close, in fact, that he is pursuing her career in dentistry nearly a decade apart. Andrea graduated with honors from UToledo with a bachelor of arts degree in biology in 2017. Peter finished his bachelor of arts degree in biology in spring semester.

His sister was not the only inspiration that led him to UToledo. During the application process, Tsatalis said he "was very impressed with the ample opportunities provided for research opportunities both on Main Campus and at UTMC, as well as the UToledo/Case Western Pipeline dental program and a diverse array of clubs."

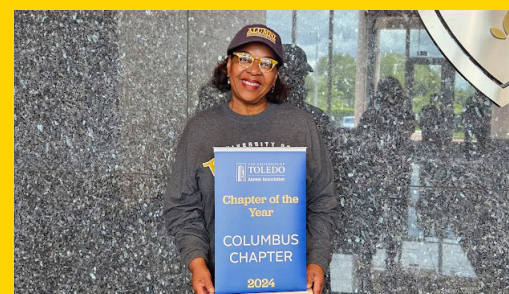
# ALUMNI ASSOCIATION AWARDS

# IMPACTING FUTURE GENERATIONS

## Toledo Native Finds Newfound Love for Hometown at The University of Toledo

"I initially had no plans on attending The University of Toledo," began David Young '88. "I wanted to go away for college. However, my parents convinced me to attend UToledo for one year and then explore other places. I never left!"

"I am definitely an example of a student that fell in love with the midnight blue and gold. I became so involved with student life I couldn't see myself anywhere else."

Young's involvement with UToledo did not stop after graduation – he has served as a staff member for 31 years. Throughout his career and involvement in UToledo's Upward Bound, Toledo Excel and Student Affairs, he has directly impacted more than 1,200 students in their pursuit of college degrees and secured approximately \$2.2 million dollars of grants and gifts for underrepresented students.

He has also led special projects for the Office of Multicultural Student Success, which include providing strategic direction to African American

initiatives as well as providing leadership for Brothers on the Rise, a group of African-American and LatinX faculty and staff who mentor current students. Young is also the current director of the University's Toledo Excel Program.

Toledo Excel is designed to prepare students for success in college by providing them with academic enrichment services and activities throughout their high school years. The program is also dedicated to developing students into conscientious and active members of the community. If Toledo Excel students successfully complete the high school portion of the program, they will receive a tuition and general fee scholarship as well as a book stipend for college. In addition to the scholarship, the program continues to support its college students with academic and personal advising, internship opportunities and other resources.

Young states that the most rewarding part of his current role is the "impact I have been able to make on students. Small victories and great ones."

"I see former Excel students coming back as college graduates, successful professionals, incredible spouses and loving parents, and knowing I played a small role in that is the real reward," said Young. "I have always thought relationships and a sense of belonging are key to student success and so the relationships with students and colleagues are incredibly important to me." 🦋

# The Extraordinary Legacy of Drs. Mary R. Smith and Hollis Merrick

Dr. Mary R. Smith, professor emerita for The University of Toledo Department of Medicine, and her late husband, Dr. Hollis Merrick, professor emeritus in the UToledo Department of Surgery, dedicated themselves, and their careers, to making UToledo and the surrounding region a better place. Through their work, and continuing generosity, they have impacted countless lives and touched thousands more by establishing programs for future generations of healthcare leaders.

Smith and Merrick relocated to Toledo, Ohio from Canada in the late 1970's. At that time only a few buildings stood on the now Health Science Campus, along with an empty field that would eventually become The University of Toledo Medical Center, a vision they were instrumental in bringing to life.

The couple interviewed for positions with the former Medical College of Ohio (MCO) and the rest was history. For decades, Dr. Smith has educated and coached students in practices of medical education and compassionate care.

As one of the first faculty members on the Health Science Campus, Dr. Smith not only taught students clinically, but brought the then Medical College of Ohio motto to life – “Enter to Learn. Go Forth to Serve.”

“The impact of Drs. Smith and Merrick extends far beyond their professional achievements. Their commitment to excellence in surgical training has left

an indelible mark on our institution and provided guidance shaping many future careers of UToledo students,” shared Dr. Christopher Cooper, Distinguished University Professor.

Throughout their careers, the couple continued to pursue ways to improve training and build resources for future generations.

In 2011, the couple helped establish a surgery training simulation room within the Interprofessional Immersive Simulation Center on the Health Science Campus. The new laboratory provided a unique and vital educational resource enhancing experiences for thousands of students as a result of their efforts.

Most recently, Dr. Smith is ensuring the continuation of their legacy with the permanent endowment of the Hollis Merrick Surgical Skills Course through a \$1 million gift to the UToledo Foundation. The gift will allow for advanced trauma learning on operative procedures. The course will provide hands-on experience for advanced trauma learning on operative procedures through review of key operative anatomy and basic techniques. Additionally, students will have opportunities to explore laparoscopic procedure methods.

“The Hollis Merrick Surgical Skills Course will revolutionize the way we train future surgeons. Dr. Smith’s generosity ensures that their legacy of excellence will continue for generations to come,” Cooper added.

A labor of love that led to millions of students, faculty members and patients being impacted by their shared vision.

“This extraordinary generosity will have a profound and lasting impact, benefiting every surgical resident in our program for generations to come,” expressed Cristina Alvarado, director of immersive and simulation-based learning. “By providing access to high-level surgical training, Drs. Smith and

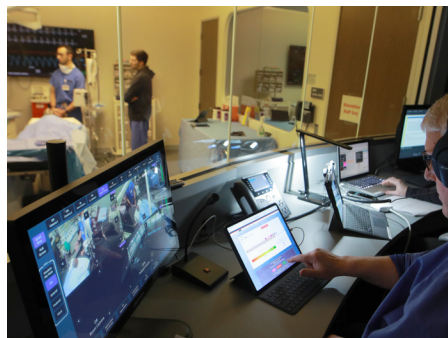
Merrick’s gift not only enhances the quality of education for our residents but also significantly elevates the standard of patient care we deliver in our community.”

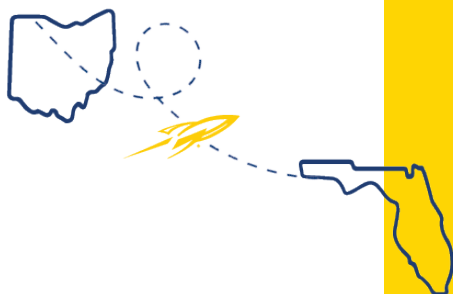
